EDITORIAL

19 October 2016: Challenges go global in Bioethics

The World Bioethics Day (WBD) - that will take place next 19 October - will see the participation of many Units of the Chair into this first new event in several different ways. Let's start from a deep call to Bioethics. This represents a necessity which is crucial in thousands of issues, but sometimes actually neglected and even unknown or ignored, and frequently misinterpreted. Not everywhere and always clearly conceptualized. Revamping bioethics means focusing on the fundamental values of human dignity and human rights, and giving a strong contribute to democracy, justice, public ethics, citizenship, respect of the rules. Because bioethics is "before everything else".

The establishment of the World Bioethics Day has been proposed during the last UNESCO Chair in Bioethics 11th World Conference in Naples, with the aim of celebrating the bioethical principles in all the world. The chosen day is the 19 October 2016 and the theme of this year is "Human Dignity and Human Rights", to whom is dedicated the article n.3 of the UNESCO Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights.

The Units of the Chair will celebrate worldwide the WBD 2016 with a program that will follow common features. The Units have been invited to involve the highest number of stakeholders (students from schools, high schools, universities, citizen, professors, teachers, children, youngsters, adults, elderly, disabled people etc....) in order to spread the bioethical spirit in the society, and through any means of

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communication, from the organization of conferences, congresses, cineforum, study days, shows and students competitions (for the best poster, essay, article related to the theme of this year) to an award for a member of the Units particularly active in the diffusion of the bioethics. Many Units have joined this celebration and we can say that in all five Continents of the globe the World Bioethics Day will be the occasion to reflect and study many crucial bioethical issues, from classical bioethics questions to the ethics of interaction between humans and robots, from experimentations with human beings to the rights of the animals and environmental bioethics.

In this Newsletter an ideal connection, a sort of *fil rouge* based on a deep certainty on the role of the bioethical reflection, will lead all of us to focusing together on an Italian initiative that have taken to the attention of the public Institutions the unique role of the Local Ethics Committees in the safeguard and promotion of the fundamental rights of life, psycho-physical integrity, dignity, freedom, individual's autonomy. A fundamental contribution into this initiative – held at the Senate of the Italian Republic in Rome, Italy – has been given by Professor Amnon Carmi, Holder and Director of the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics, Haifa.

The Italian "case" confirms that bioethics is not "instinctive" neither can be top-down imposed once for all: it has to be locally and constantly revitalized through frequent occasions for debating and discussing. In that way it will be reinforced the value of the social pluralism that represents the basis of the concept of democracy in itself.



INTRODUCTION

The establishment of the World Bioethics Day has been proposed by Prof. Amnon Carmi, Holder and Head of the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics (Haifa) and unanimously approved by all Units Heads during the last UNESCO Chair in Bioethics World Conference held in Naples - Italy, on October 2015. This day is aimed at celebrating the Bioethical Principles worldwide through an event that will take place each year on the 19 October from now on. The chosen theme of this first year of celebration is "Human Dignity and Human Rights" (Article 3 of the UNESCO Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights), and all the Chair's Units have decided to follow a common program, integrated by many different activities.

The collaborating Units have done a great job organizing congresses, conferences, round tables, cineforums, and so on. The details of their celebrations will follow this introduction. The core aim of this huge project is to involve as many stakeholders as possible, and to spread the Human dignity and Human Rights promotion in all the world. The celebrations will take place in Universities, Institutions, Schools, libraries, public places etc. so that all the citizen could appreciate the importance and the meaning of "bioethical thinking".

The common program is dived in six parts, and it foresees an opening speech by the Head of the Unit or the Head of the Institution, followed by the greetings of the highest local representatives, International or local representatives of UNESCO and the presentation of an award to an active member of the Units. Then there will be a Guest lecture by eminent personalities in Bioethics on the topic "Human Dignity and Human Rights" and a panel discussion by experts in Bioethics/ Senior Faculty open to Junior staff, PG residents, UG students and Paramedics (Nursing and other supporting staff) and other stakeholders as decided by the Unit.

To encourage and enhance students' participation in the program, they have been programmed many activities dedicated to them, as a debate competition on "Human Dignity and Human Rights", a poster exhibition on "Human Dignity and Human Rights" and an essay writing competition on "Human Dignity and Human Rights": the winners of these competitions will be awarded during the day. There is also an International students' poster competition whose winner will be announced during the world bioethics day.

Units have been required to produce their own Banners for the event that has to carry the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics, Haifa official LOGO and the World Bioethics Day official LOGO, that has been chosen among many proposals by the Units that joined an *ad hoc* competition for the best LOGO. The winner of this competition is the Italian graphic designer Emanuela Buccelli. An International Organizing Committee has been working constantly during this year to organize the event.

This Committee, appointed by Chairholder Prof Amnon Carmi, has some regional coordinators, whose names are: for the Unit and sub-units of Italy, Dr. Miroslava Vasinova; for the Units in India, Dr. Smita Deshpande; for the Units in America, Dr. Gina Lorena Garcia Martinez; for the Units in Asia, Dr. Princy Louis Palatty, for the Units in Europe, Dr. Gerhard Fortwengel. The members of the Committee are Dr. Rui Nunes; Dr. Altin Stafa and Dr. Tsai Fu Chang Daniel, while the General Coordinator is Dr. Praveen Arora.

ALBANIA UNIT



The second session of the congress, will see the the interventions of Mr. Besnik Mustafaj, National Coordinator of UNAOC-United Nations Alliance of Civilizations who will talk about the interreligious dialogue, the basis of mutual understanding, Ms. Elsa Ballauri, Executive Director of AHRG – Albanian Human Rights Group with her speech on Sexual orientation, a human right and another intervention on Education as a basic element of human dignity.

During the third part of the congress, Prof. Ridvan Alimehmeti it will discussed the right of the terminally ill patient to be informed; medical scenarios and current legal platform, with Dr. Armand Gurakuqi (Public Prosecutor, Tirana Court, Albania).

ARGENTINA UNIT

The Argentinean Unit of International Network of UNESCO Chair in Bioethics under the supervision of its Head Prof. Dr. Moty Benyakar M.D. Ph.D. will open the celebration starting with the speech of Prof. Dr. Moty Benyakar, M.D. Ph.D., Head of the Unit, followed by Dr. Enrique Novelli, M.D., Ph.D., MEMBER OF IFT. The guest lecture will be given by Dr. Susana Otero Ph.D., MEMBER OF IFT. Then a panel discussion will follow, with the participation of Dr. Irene Cambra Badii Ph.D., MEMBER OF IFT and Dr. Eduardo Ramos M.D., MEMBER OF IFT.

It is also foreseen a poster exhibition at the University of Salvador that will take place on September 2016 for a Target audience composed by Graduate and Postgraduate students.



Other activities will include:

- 1) Postgraduate Course: 'Trauma and Disruption' taught by Prof. Dr. Moty Benyakar M.D. Ph.D. and Dr. Eduardo Ramos M.D. and organized by Iberoamerican Ecobioethics Network of UNESCO Chair in Bioethics, on May 12 and 13, 2016 at the National University of San Luis.
- 2) II Interdisciplinary Seminar about Ethics and Research at the University of Salvador, Faculty of Psychology and Educational Psychology. Pilar, Buenos Aires on June 14, 2016 (from 9am to 1pm). The lecturer will be Dr. Susana Otero Ph.D. On this Seminar, projects about different researches will be presented, by researchers from the Institutes of Research, with the aim of making an epistemic, methodological and ethical exchange to deal with dilemmas in research, between

various proposals of the different Academic Units from University of Salvador, Research Institute of the Faculty of Psychology and Educational Psychology, Research Institute of Arts and Architecture, Institute for Research in Agronomy.

- 3) III Intercurricular Seminar about ethics and research (undergraduate and postgraduate students) at the University of Salvador, Faculty of Psychology and Educational Psychology will be discussed themes as Ethics, Bioethics and Research, dilemmatic situations in different contexts, ethics, Moral and Deontology, Ethics, Bioethics and Ecobioethics, Professional Ethics and Research, Psychology and Educational Psychology on September 5th, 2016 (8am to 4.30pm) and September 6th, 2016 (8am-8pm). The lecturer will be Dr. Susana Otero Ph.D. The III Intercurricular Seminar about ethics and research aim is to provide researchers, academics, PhD students and post graduate students a place to exchange and transmit their knowledge and professional experiences facing dilemmatic situations in different contexts to undergraduate students.
- 4) First Seminar of the Iberoamerican Ecobioethics Network of UNESCO Chair in Bioethics: World Bioethics Day at the University of Morón on September 2016. The lecturer will be Dr. Enrique Novelli, Ph.D. Seminar for teachers, graduate and undergraduate students and local authorities of Morón, Interdisciplinary integration of the Faculty of Philosophy, Economics, Law, Agriculture, Health Sciences and Natural Sciences.
- 5) Confidentiality in Mediation, the teacher in charge is Ruben Veiga, Ph.D. in Mediation. The targeted audience will be 4th year Students of the Medication Chair Faculties of Psychology, Philosophy, Educational Sciences and Humanities of the University of Morón. The aim is to reflect on the importance of confidentiality, linking the eponymous principle of mediation with the professional work of psychologists, from an ethical / transdisciplinary approach. The scheduled activity will be held in Class and there will be a special debate with previous reading of specific literature and subsequent construction of a report, which will be part of the evaluation of the course. It will be held on a date to confirm, if possible close to October 19th, 2016; World Bioethics Day.
- 6) Ethical and anthropological character on the recognition of the Other as anthropological pair in educational practice. The teacher in charge is Dr. Maria Cecilia Colombani, Full Professor of Philosophical Problems and Philosophical Anthropology Chairs, and Director of the Gender Open Chair of the Faculty of Philosophy, Educational Sciences and Humanities of the University of Morón. The aim is to reflect on the Other as an anthropological pair in educational practice. The targeted audience will be students and the general public that will have the chance to attend an open class on the chapter 'Los lazos de reciprocidad en el aula. Saber, poder y pasión' del libro "Los estados generales de la educación filosófica y su intervención en la vida democrática" (Editorial Biblos). The approximate dates are September 23rd, 10 am and September 28th, 8 pm.
- 7) Conference: "Aspects of contemporary environmental philosophy; integrating science, ethics and education", The teacher in charge is Dr. Alicia Irene Bugallo, Visiting Professor of the PhD in Philosophy of the University of Morón, Ecophilosophy Seminar. The contents will be the place of the University of Morón in receiving environmental philosophy in the country; Environmental Philosophy, as atmosphere and as trends; the Anthropocene and challenges to philosophical re-

flection: environmental ethics, complex thinking, inclusive pedagogies. The event is aimed at analysing and reflecting on the contributions of environmental philosophy to inclusive pedagogies for an audience composed by teachers from all levels. Date: August 31 from 6 pm to 8 pm;

- 8) The abstinence rule in psychoanalytic treatment. The teacher in charge will be Dr. Enrique M. Novelli PhD for the audience composed by students from 4th year of the Psychology Faculty, with the aim to analyse and reflect on ethics in psychoanalytic treatments. The activity is a Special Class for Psychology Faculty, in Training area. Approximate date: October 2016, from 9 am to 1 pm and from 6 pm to 10 pm.
- 9) Training sessions in Boulogne Hospital: the importance of bioethics in hospitals on September 2016. For health professionals, mental health services, psychologists and psychiatrists. The discussed topics will be 1. The role of ethical principles in diagnostic communication: patient labeled or oriented? 2. Honorary clinical practice, subversion of the 'psi' system. Participants from: Municipal Hospital of Boulogne, University of Salvador, Psychoanalytic Association of Argentina (APA). Referent: Lic. Nestor Tamburini.


AUSTRIA UNIT

Fondazione Salvatore Maugeri, Pavia

At the Salvatore Maugeri Foundation IRCCS in PAVIA, the World Bioethics Day will be celebrated on the 19 October. The congress will start with the authorithies greetings by Roberto Pedretti, Director of Pavia Scientific Institute IRCCS Salvatore Maugeri Foundation. Carlo Pasetti, Director of the Ethics Committee of the Salvatore Maugeri Foundation, will talk about "Bioethics in Rehabilitation: the dignity of being independent again in the daily life as everyone's right".

Monica Schmid, Director of U.O. Vision Rehabilitation IRCCS Salvatore Maugeri Foundation and Ines Giorgi U.O. Director of U.O. Psichology IRCCS Salvatore Maugeri Foundation, will discuss the question: "What do we mean for rehabilitation of low sight patient?".

Grazia Conforti, Expert-DG Welfare Regione Lombardia, will give a speech titled "From 284/1997 law to the draft of national's new guidelines: Lombardia's point of view", followed by the Associations' point of view on the same topic, introduced by Nicola Stilla, President of Blind People Italian Union and Giovanni Milano, Agency for prevention of blindness.

In order to involve the audience, there have been invited two patients who will give their witnesses to the audience.

Paolo Emilio Bianchi, Director of Cl. Ophthalmology IRCCS Policlinico San Matteo Foundation, will talk on "The relevance of rehabilitation beyond the therapy".

After the speeches, it is organized the award ceremony dedicated to the student's ethics topic of Rehabilitation Technique.

To involve the audience with an original method, it has been proposed a special experience, the "coffee in the dark" for group of 6/8 people; a plurisensorial experience in the darkness, to put people in the shoes of blind people's experiences of the world.







The World Bioethics Day will be preceded by a Training Course on "Bioethics and Cinema" that will be held at the Maugeri Foundation in Pavia, Italy, between September and November 2016. This is a training course in an innovative way to address the bioethical issues through the movies and the methods of narrative medicine.

How the scientific literature suggests, movies provide a systematic framework to foster the de-

velopment of critical thinking skills and the connections between theory and practice in ethical decisions. The movie telling has the opportunity not only to illustrate the bioethical issues vividly, but also to explore thesis an topics in the disease and in treatment decisions. It allows the construction of the different perspectives of the patient, family members and care givers.

The course includes a series of 5 days lasting three hours each in which will be addressed by speakers the following bioethical topics: 1)the health worker / patient –caregiver relationship -2) Disability and dignity 3) The end of life, euthanasia 4) The technique and the sick body 5) Genetics.

After the scientific reports, every day, will be shown a picture movie as facilitator for reflection on the subject, treated by the speakers. Subsequently they will be formed discussion groups of different professional operators. The group will be an important moment for the discussion of "ethical dilemmas" emerged.

The following movies will be screened: Dear Diary by Nanni Moretti, 1993; Sea Inside (Mar adentro) of Aljandro Amenàba, 2004; Million Dollar Baby Clint Eastwood, 2004; The belly of the architect Peter Greenaway 1987; Blade Runner by Ridley Scott in 1982.

Promoters and managers of the course are Dr. Francesco Cupella (Departmental Unit of Gastro-enterology and Digestive Endoscopy of Maugeri and Dr Ines Giorgi (Psychology of Maugeri Service).

The speakers of the Maugeri Foundation (doctors and psychologists) will be joined by renowned experts such as Dr. Carlo Pasetti, President of the Ethics Committee of the Maugeri Foundation, prof. Paul Danesino, for its expertise in Forensic and Professor Cesare Danesino, for his skills of Genetics and a lawyer Alessandra De Gasperi.

The course is intended for physicians, nurses, rehabilitation therapists, psychologists, professionals of the juridical sciences and medical students of Pavia University.

University of Studies of Milan (Forensic Medicine Department)

The World Bioethics Day will be celebrated on the 19 October with a congress on the theme "Conversations on human dignity, human rights and fundamental freedoms" at Napoleonic Hall, Milan. Human dignity, consensus and participation issues will be discussed.

This congress marks the beginning of a series of events planned in honour of the World Bioethics Day 2016 celebrations.







members of local hospital ethics committees.








VENEZUELA UNIT

Official report by Alessandra Pentone, International Adviser

Rome. July 12, 2016- In the spellbinding scenario of the Italian House of Senate (Palazzo Madama), the member of the Senate and Vice-president of the Hygiene and Health Board of the European Union Policies, Prof. Lucio Romano, promoted the Conference: "Clinical Experimentation and Ethics Committee: which future? n. 536/2014 UE Regulation".

The 99 articles included in nineteen chapters of this regulation state the new rules concerning clinical trials on medicinal products for human use, and the repealing of Directive 2001/20/EC (http://ec.europa.eu/health/files/eudralex/vol1/reg_2014_536/reg_2014_536_en.pdf)

This was a very interesting opportunity for some of the main Italian experts in this field to arouse a lively debate about the utmost importance of Ethics Committees in clinical trials, as a bridge between science and ethics, watching first of all that" the rights, safety, dignity and well-being of subjects are protected and prevail over all other interests", as article no. 3 of the Regulation mentions. Professor Amnon Carmi, Head of the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics, as a special guest, gave a lecture on UNESCO vision of Ethics Committees in the light of the 2005 UNESCO Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights.

After an overview of the clinical trials and the ethics committees in the different States of Europe, the speakers, one by one, focused the core of the discussion on a misinterpretation of the EU Regulation n.536/2014 following which a unique National Ethics Committee should replace all the Local Ethics Committees, putting in danger the democratic pluralism concerning the different experts, members of an ethics committee, who should feel free to express their opinion for the sake of the person and the research at the same time.

"Research arises conflicts and dilemmas among the rights of the individual who undertakes the experiment, the rights of the patient, the interests of the researcher, the interests of the society in acquiring increasing levels of health, economic advantages of who is promoting the research" affirms Professor Claudio Buccelli, President of the Italian Society of Legal Medicine and Insurance (SIMLA).

"The ethical reflection that is part of the bio-law and professionals ethics codes, has broaden its interventions on several values on which it is possible to count, and on different fields of the scientific research, paying attention to problems, dilemmas related to informed consent, to the privacy of people involved in the research and to their personal data, to the use of placebo, to the involvement of vulnerable people, to the levels of acceptable risks, to the primary interests of people, to the way to restore the possible problems arisen during the experimentation, to the compassionate use of drugs, to the scientific relevance of the protocols, to the qualifications and requirements of researchers, to the diffusion of the results in the Scientific community.

In order to have an ethics based experimentation, several things are necessary, like the principles of solidarity (connected to the positive results of the biomedical research), the safeguard of human lives (so that it is NOT acceptable the violation of life or a danger or risk for the patients' health), the autonomy (with the informed and free consent of the subject), the totality (or therapeutic, where the risks of the experimentation have to be proportioned with regard to the expected advantages). These are all fundamental principles and the most important one is the freedom and the self-determination of the research."

A Single National Committee instead of the Territorial Ethics Committees "would lead to **theoretical** and **vague** evaluations of the clinical trials, because it would have not be conducted following the irreplaceable analysis of the real and concrete context structural and environmental where the experimentations take place; this would lead to dramatic and negative con-

sequences on the human dignity, safety, well-being of patients and on the operative environment of researchers, who would be deprived of the irreplaceable connection to ethics behavior that is guaranteed by Ethics Committees. These organisms cannot follow the directives of the promoters of the researches that can result in damages for the patients who take part into the experiments." Prof. Carmine Dionisi considers the Local Ethics Committees as "public guarantors" "to safeguard the fundamental rights in an effective and efficient way". "They are part of the Research Structures in Hospitals and other Institutions where the studies are conducted and they are the only Institutions able to evaluate Protocols in a tangible way".

Prof. Maurizio Mori underlines that "there are many types of Ethics Committees, but they all represent a new way to take part into the social life and developing the scientific research in the biomedic field, that is so guaranteed in its actions." "Ethics Committees were born not to stop the bio-medical research but to encourage it."

Prof. Alfredo Anzani resumed the question as follows: "We are convinced that a plurality of Ethics Committees is to be preferred to a Unique Ethics Committee. It is though necessary that Local Ethics Committees work well with a technical-scientific secretariat, efficient and valuable. The extensiveness of Ethics Committees is a richness that cannot be lost. This would avoid a new center of power. It represents a richness in the humanism and the diffusion of bioethics sensibility, sharable and aware. There cannot be lost the original scope of the Ethics Committees. Even Ethics Committees follow ethics principles that can be reached with a shared dialogue on sharable values of the human reason, which are fundamental and inalienable. A deep analysis of the Regulation is to be intended as a way to re-allocate the Ethics Committees and not a way to eliminate them, since science and ethics are inseparable".

Olympic games: it's time to change

"The most important thing in the Olympic Games is not to win but to take part, just as the most important thing in life is not the triumph but the struggle. The essential thing is not to have conquered but to have fought well."

Bishop Ethelbert Talbot, 1908 Olympic Games

In 776 B.C., in Olympia, Greece, took place the first ancient games where local and foreign athletes could test themselves competing races, chariot races, boxing, discus and javelin throws, etc., expressing their physical potentials and strength capabilities in honor of Zeus, the father of the Greek gods and goddesses.

From that time on, every four years for almost twelve centuries, these games were always held in Olympia and were named Olympics for their location in this city in the western part of the Peloponnese.

In the same peninsula, near the city of Sparta, the tradition tells that all unfit infants, such as weak, sickly, deformed or mentally retarded, were thrown into a chasm of mount Taygetus, just like the worst of criminals, abandoned to an inescapable destiny of starvation and death.

In 1896, in Athens, Greece, after almost 1500 years from the last Greek Olympic games, took place the first modern Olympics, largely thanks to the efforts of Baron Pierre de Coubertin (1863-1937), who strongly supported the importance of physical education. This event featured 280 participants from 13 nations, competing in 43 events. Some of the Fundamental Principles of Olympism state:

- 1. "Olympism is a philosophy of life, exalting and combining in a balanced whole the qualities of body, will and mind. Blending sport with culture and education, Olympism seeks to create a way of life based on the joy of effort, the educational value of good example and respect for universal fundamental ethical principles."
- 2."The goal of Olympism is to place sport at the service of the harmonious development of man, with a view to promoting a peaceful society concerned with the preservation of human dignity."
- 3."The practice of sport is a human right. Every individual must have the possibility of practicing sport, without discrimination of any kind and in the Olympic spirit, which requires mutual understanding with a spirit of friendship, solidarity and fair play...".
- 4. "Any form of discrimination with regard to a country or a person on grounds of race, religion, politics, gender or otherwise is incompatible with belonging to the Olympic Movement."
- In 1960, in Rome, Italy, took place the first official Paralympics games (from the Greek preposition "para" "beside" or "alongside" and the word "Olympic", the Paralympics being the parallel games to the Olympics) featuring 400 athletes from 23 countries. Starting with a few kind of dis-

abilities, mostly consisting in spinal cord injured or amputees' veterans from the previous world war, with the time the Paralympics games included athletes belonging to a wide variety of physical and intellectual impairments, divided in several competition categories, which differed from sport to sport. The aim of the Paralympics is "to enable Paralympics athletes to achieve sporting excellence and inspire and excite the world".

These games were born to emphasize their participants' ability, not their disability, their athletes' achievements, not their limits.

A first step to get close Olympics to Paralympics games was made in 2001 by an agreement that the host city of the games had to manage both events. In fact, Paralympics games follow the Olympics ones almost after a month. But this is not and cannot be enough.

If we agree, as we do, with the articles no. 10 and no.11 of the 2005 UNESCO Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights (Article 10 – Equality, justice and equity - *The fundamental equality of all human beings in dignity and rights is to be respected so that they are treated justly and equitably;* Article 11 – Non-discrimination and non-stigmatization - *No individual or group should be discriminated against or stigmatized on any grounds, in violation of human dignity, human rights and fundamental freedoms.)* we cannot accept that these two world events have to take place separately.

If we strongly believe, as we do, that disability is part of life and should become a "normal" and "suitable" way of living, as every human being deserves, we support what Lord Sebastian Coe said about the 2012 Summer Paralympics and 2012 Summer Olympics in London: "We want to change public attitudes towards disability, celebrate the excellence of Paralympics sport and to enshrine from the very outset that the two Games are an integrated whole."

Olympics and Paralympics games should occur together in a unique sport celebration, where abled and disabled athletes will alternatively compete, both enhancing not only their physical records but their high values as human beings. The one and only universal competition will be the beginning of a new era, as a lively example for present and future generations of a possible and positive human integration.

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
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Bioethics & Migrants

Position statement on the migrant situation in Europe

The influx of migrants into Europe and the consequent humanitarian crisis elicits the need for professional involvement in the fields of health and education, as well as specific accompanying measures in the areas of language and communication.

The Comité Permanent de Liaison des Orthophonistes/Logopèdes de l'Union Européenne (CPLOL) supports all actions towards the best care and support of families seeking refuge in European countries. Apart from their basic needs, this population on the move need to develop communication competences in order to have the best possible integration chances in new environments and settings. Moreover, communication strategies must be established between key workers and migrants to ensure that these families have optimal chances in these precarious situations. As Speech and Language Therapists, and as communication experts across Europe, we consider it our ethical duty and responsibility to be open to these new challenges and to respond as professionals.

With this in view, SLTs throughout Europe can help in different areas:

Work in the forefront:

- Enhance communication skills during the reception phase by promoting, developing and supporting the communication skills of the key workers/volunteers.
- Raise awareness of communication strategies, facilitators and challenges in multicultural settings.
- Act as consultants in the development of Alternative and Augmentative Communication (AAC) e.g. for communication boards.

? Education:

- Work in collaboration with language teachers to use culturally sensitive strategies in the development of basic language skills.
- Locate educators or SLTs in the migrant population and create a network which can support children and adults in need of specific services within the migrant communities.
- Train officials in host or transit countries on the basics of transcultural communication in order to facilitate in bureaucratic matters.
- Act as liaisons in promoting the acquisition of the host language on a spoken and written level.

② Health:

- Provide expert support in the field of SLT to cases where our professional expertise is needed.
- Assist in access to health services.


Integration:

Assist in the lowering of cultural barriers, through communication and exchange of knowledge / experiences promoting a multicultural perspective and dialogue between cultures. Be the interlocutor & mediator with public and private bodies.

2 Entrepreneurship:

Assist adults with specific educational requests/demands on the training level, for their integration in the labour market, based on our support in facilitating communication and language.

Prosthesis, hybridization between humans and machines and human enhancement. When Man and Technology blend together, is it time to think about a new definition of human being?

The core of the article are these four questions, which represent a cause for reflection about a typical Bioethical subject, e.g. the relationship between man, science and technology and the consequences of the power of manipulation of things and life which enabled mankind to cross some limits that - since now - have been thought as fixed by Nature once for all:

- a) When does a prosthesis exceed health care limits becoming a human enhancement operation?
- b) Where is the boundary which separates a socially acceptable artificial device from a dangerous or unethical one?
- c) Which features define a human being?
- d) Is it time to re-define the current idea of human being?

When does a prosthesis exceed health care limits becoming a human enhancement operation? Always.

In order to explain this provocative answer, it could be helpful to present some introductory observations. The word *prosthesis* comes from the ancient Greek word $\pi\rho\delta\sigma\theta\epsilon\sigma\iota\varsigma$ (prósthesis, addition), from $\pi\rho\sigma\tau\iota\theta\eta\mu\iota$ (prostíthēmi, I add), from $\pi\rho\delta\varsigma$ (prós, towards) plus $\tau\iota\theta\eta\mu\iota$ (títhēmi, I place).

Following the etymology of the word, the main conveyed idea is that something is added to something else which - it can be inferred - should not have necessarily missing or damaged parts. Oddly enough, in the current agreed definition of the word *prosthesis*, the ancient idea of addition has been replaced with the idea of restoring, replacing, the usual **but disturbed** state of affairs, as it can be seen from this definition: a prosthesis is an artificial device that replaces, restores, in full or in part, the original functionality of a missing body part, which may be lost through trauma, disease, or congenital conditions.

Following this definition, it is possible to include in the set of prosthesis some artificial devices

and products like drugs, artificial arms, legs, exoskeletons, artificial organs, artificial implants like cochlear ones or brain and heart pacemakers, even ART (Assisted reproductive technology), since they all are artificial devices or procedures or products used to restore the original functionality of a healthy human body. Later it will be discussed the concept of healthy human body, which is not as clear as it could seem at first glance.

On the contrary, the idea of addition is conveyed through the politically incorrect couple of word human enhancement, whose definition - according to the American Institute for Ethics and Emerging Technologies[1] - is any attempt to temporarily or permanently overcome the current limitations of the human body through natural or artificial means. It is the use of technological means to select or alter human characteristics and capacities, whether or not the alteration results in characteristics and capacities that lie beyond the existing human range.

The fact that the alteration could or could not result in characteristics and capacities that lie beyond the existing human range, represents an essential specification which enables us to include the artificial device known as prosthesis in the wider set of artificial means used to overcome the current limitations of the human body, so that even a prosthesis represents a sort of human enhancement.

Having said that, the answer to the question: "when does a prosthesis exceed health care limits becoming a human enhancement operation" cannot be different from *always* and the infamous human enhancement artificial devices suddenly lose their aura of immorality, moving the problem from the device in itself to the social acceptance of the device, which - as it has been showed - is only in part related to the device tout-court or to its usefulness.

b) Which leads us directly to the next question: "where is the boundary which separates a socially acceptable artificial device from a dangerous or unethical one?". The thought-provoking answer is: nowhere.

To explain this answer, it is useful to start with an example showing how much weight the social acceptance of an artificial device has on the development of the device itself. The example is taken from the history of the *bancomat* (ATM), as told by C. Flamigni, 2014[2].

When the first Bankmatic automated teller machine (ATM) was invented by Luther George Simjian in 1939 and used by the Citycorp Bank of New York, many people complained about the fact that the device was only used by those people like prostitutes and gambling den who did not want to show their faces in front of a bank cashier. So the device was removed and the invention had to wait 30 years before it could be accepted later in the 60s.

Was the ATM unethical or dangerous in itself? Why did people react that way to it? As Luther George Simjian said in his diary, it is necessity which pushes inventors to develop new technologies and devices. Maybe in the 30s there was not yet the necessity for ATMs, but nowadays that money exchange has to be fast-paced and trackable these devices are everywhere and the idea of immorality and dangerousness related to an ATM makes us smile. But it is society who establishes what is necessary and what is not.

If we agree on this idea, technologies that society considers necessary have more chances to be welcomed and implemented. For example, if society considers desirable and necessary increasing life expectancy and its quality, many resources will be allocated to researches aimed at this purpose. Once again, if society considers necessary the development of an artificial heart in order to save the life of a human being with an original but damaged heart[3], probably a lot of resources will be invested on the development of such technology.

Turning back to prosthesis, an artificial device is more likely to be considered necessary and therefore accepted by society if it is supposed to overcome a disease or an illness. But there arouses another problem related to the definition of healthy human body.

To a certain degree what is considered as disease or illness is culturally and socially constructed too, and it cannot be solved simply by defining health as the full expression of species-typical function, because this concept is variable. This phenomenon is known as the so-called medicine nosological elasticity, where nosology is a branch of medicine that deals with classification of diseases[4].

Actually, what society considers as a typical function of the human species has been changed throughout the centuries: living with permanently damaged lungs could have been impossible in the 15th century, but nowadays living and executing some species-typical functions with permanently damaged lungs is possible thanks to artificial lungs.

In order to give another example, it could be useful talking about some bioethical problems related to the use of ART, Assisted reproductive technology. Nowadays many scientists, researchers, academics, politicians, etc., are concerned with the ethical questions that arise from the use of some assisted human reproduction techniques. One of the most controversial issue was [5] the development of an artificial womb. It is writen was because the project has been so stigmatized by the society and by the media that scientists who were working on it preferred not to carry on with the researches and replacing their attention to bioengineering uterine tissue to repair a damaged or malformed uterus[6].

Why the idea of repairing damaged or malformed but already exiting wombs is considered desirable and supported by the society while the idea of a totally artificial womb is seen as immoral and horrific? Maybe because the popular imagination fears the creation of a sort of human being factory full of incubators where children are cultivated rather than brought up?

Supposing scientists implemented a perfectly working artificial womb and implanted it in a woman just as a socially acceptable and welcomed artificial lung, would the artificial womb be considered a socially acceptable prosthesis, being it an artificial device that replaces, restores, in full or in part, the original functionality of a missing body part, which may be lost through trauma, disease, or congenital conditions?

Or would the artificial womb be still considered an immoral or dangerous way to permit unhealthy women to enhance her-selves giving birth thanks to technology? On the other hand, why a woman with an unhealthy lung should have more chances to be assisted than a woman with an unhealthy womb? Maybe because a woman can live without a womb or with a damaged

womb but cannot live with a damaged lung. But is this the problem?

At this point, many new questions arise which would be very interesting to analyse in another article, maybe paying attention to the bio-political issues related to it: do we have to concentrate our efforts only on life-saving treatments and not on life quality-enhancing ones? Is really this what society desires? Is society aware of the consequences of its desires? Are these needs real or induced? And who or what induced that desires? And how can we establish what a real need is? To what extent these desires and needs are safe and morally acceptable and should be supported or limited?

Definitely, bioethicists have still a lot of job to carry on, provided that their job is to make questions and stimulate a wide debate on these issues which should not be confined within academic lecture halls, but should be spread across society, at any level.

In conclusion, as showed, the answer to the question "where is the boundary which separates a socially acceptable artificial device from a dangerous or immoral one?" is nowhere because that boundary is as floating as society's (real or induced, conscious or unconscious) desires and needs.

c) We do not have to forget that society is composed by human beings, whose main characteristic is (currently) to transform, as it will be discussed when answering the third question: which features do define a human being? Mutations. If humans mutate, society mutates and so its needs and desires.

Currently, all humans are mutants and the (platonic, indeed) idea of a fixed human nature is no more sustainable. To explain this statement it could be useful starting from the essay by J. Habermas, The Future of Human Nature, 2003[7]. In this book Habermas explains his reasons for viewing genetic manipulation and pre-natal screening as impermissible (except to prevent disease and serious impairment) and asks to the reader if it is morally acceptable enabling humans to program their genetic makeup and thus their existence through biotechnology.

As it will be shown soon, the question is misleading, because it presumes:

- a) that humans have been remaining the same since their appearance throughout the centuries;
- b) that a human existence is determined entirely by its genetic makeup.

In this article the assumption b) will not be discussed in details, as it weakness is clear: genetic reductionism. This critique is based on another assumption which is that the complexity of human beings cannot be reduced to genetic, because human beings are (hopefully) more than the result of their biological processes. Regarding to the assumption a), the problem here is that human species does not have a fixed-by-nature and immutable essence, as humans have always been programming themselves throughout the centuries using different methods, thus manipulating their bodies and the surrounding world in order to enhance the quality and the duration of life.

We start transforming and manipulating our body and the surrounding world since the day that we were born. This is easy to understand simply noticing the fact that thanks to its ability to manipulate the surrounding world and itself using different tools and processes, human species has improved its life expectancy during the centuries.

Now, the problem is that more sophisticated, powerful and potentially dangerous methods of

manipulation are available, and so mutations should be designed more carefully than before and not forbidden a priori.

According to R. Marchesini, author of Post-Human[8], the method used by humans to transform themselves and the surrounding world in order to enhance their capabilities is a continuing hybridisation with animals, vegetables and now technology, a co-evolutionary process. Marchesini criticised the obsolete definitions of human being given by humanism and trans-humanism because they assume the idea of the human's self-sufficiency, as humans were or could be totally independent and isolated from their bodies and their surrounding world. Both humanism and trans-humanism are unable to understand the essential contribution of animals, vegetables and technologies to the evolution of humankind, so they are no more sustainable.

In addition, human self-comprehension is related to the external world: they always make a comparison between what they currently can do and what vegetables, animals and now technological products can do, so they will always try to overcome their current limits and the mutation process probably would never stop. In order to make an example, human brain is usually compared to a computer, but there are many things that a computer can do and a human brain cannot do, so we discovered limits which we did not feel to have before the invention of the computers and this works as a stimulus to find new solutions to enhance natural brain potential.

If we agree on the fact that the features which define a human being are variable and unpredictable mutations, we should not fear the challenges we have to face now that science is our coevolutionary partner and try to do our best to transform ourselves in something which could make us proud of humanity.

But how can humankind be proud of itself?

Let us try to suggest a way through which humans could answer to this question, starting from a definition of human which would be currently widely accepted.

A human being is that particular being able to transform consciously and independently itself and the surrounding world according to an autonomously set purpose.

A purpose is autonomously set when the decision is based on awareness of the facts, resulting from information and education. Knowledge and research could therefore be the key of our future mutations, associated with feelings of empathy and modesty for every creature. The way to face this difficult challenge could be giving people methods and instruments through education (starting from schools) and awareness campaigns in order to develop their personal opinion and to make their informed decisions on what they want and do not want to be and to do, without easy sensationalisms and stigmatisations, always keeping in mind that the more powerful tools are, the greater responsibilities arise.

d) In conclusion, is it time to re-define the current idea of human being? Not for now.

For many centuries being human has been synonymous with (hopefully) consciously and independently transforming on purpose and manipulating the surrounding world and them-self, and presumably this meaning will remain the same. For now, at least.

In fact, as Heraclitus reminds us, all entities move and nothing remains still[9], so even humans' attitude to transformation could change in the future, or we could be asked to re-define the idea

of human being because there will be other things or creatures able to manipulate their world and themselves the way humans do. Who know?

The challenge is open.

Human Cloning; an Unnecessary Harm to Humanity

We are humans; beings with intrinsic value in a higher sense of existence and not by virtue of our status, stage of development, means of reproduction or conception. In 1997, the world was both shocked and fascinated by the announcement in the journal Nature by Ian Wilmut and colleagues of their successful cloning of Dolly the sheep from a single cell. This raised the prospects of Nano-biotechnology and human cloning; placing on humanity the burden of rejection or regulation of this technology with regard to the dignity and benefits of human beings. Potentially, human cloning holds enormous benefits with grave detrimental effects on all humans. Nonetheless, with ongoing research of safe and morally acceptable alternatives; human cloning proves to be quite an unnecessary harm to humanity.

Human cloning is the creation of genetically identical copy of an existing, or previously existing human being. The somatic cell nuclear transfer (SCNT) technique is currently the most common method of cloning; which involves the fusion of the nucleus of a somatic cell and an enucleated egg cell.

The two common types of theoretical human cloning are: therapeutic cloning which involves cloning human embryos for use in medical research and organ transplants, and reproductive cloning which results in a child that's genetically identical to his/her parent.

Perhaps the most important and as well disturbing potential application of therapeutic cloning is in human stem cell research. This could lead to the treatment of genetic and regenerative diseases. However, the destruction of embryos in the process of harvesting embryonic stem cell is simply barbaric and an affront to human dignity.

It is not a myth or a religious dogma that the development of human life begins at fertilization; it's a scientific fact that should not be distorted. The human embryo is not just a clump of blood cells, it is a developing human with complete genetic composition just like other members of the human species.

Our negligence to the human rights of embryos is an expression of our unworthiness of existence because after all, we are all members of the same species. Human embryos deserve to be treated with dignity and not degraded to a mere research object. In the words of Immanuel Kant in his Metaphysics of Morals; "human dignity required that individuals should be treated as ends and not simply as means to an end". Alternatively, the destructive acquisition of embryonic stem cells is avoidable and stem cell research can be advanced with respect to the dignity of human life.

In 2015, some group of scientists reported in the journal Cell the report of their successful gen-

eration of human induced pluripotent stem cells (hIPSCs) lines from blood samples. Notably, these hIPSCs could differentiate into the three germ layers, just like embryonic stem cells and they were obtained from blood which does not involve the termination of human life in embryos. This is quite a promising feat in regenerative medicine and a good alternative to the harmful embryonic stem cell research. With viable and safe alternatives available, destructive therapeutic cloning is absolutely unnecessary.

Human reproductive cloning has been projected as a possible last resort for infertile couples who wish to create genetically related children. However, this poses grave danger to the health of clones and survival of human population.

In 2013, a report in journal of veterinary internal medicine, "Neonatal morbidity and mortality of 31 calves derived from somatic cloning", showed high morbidity and mortality rate in calves from birth to two years of age. Considering the high mortality rate and various health risks observed in animals, human clones would rather not be created.

In Vitro Fertilization (IVF) with a low 2%-3% risk of birth defects is an acceptable and safe alternative to human reproductive cloning. Scientific advancement and reproductive rights of infertile couples should not undermine the health of clone humans. As rightfully proclaimed in the Universal Declaration of Bioethics and Human Rights, Article 3, "The interest and wellbeing of the individual [clone] should have priority over the sole interest of science or society".

On a broader note, human reproductive cloning is a form of inbreeding, it takes away genetic diversity and increases the extinction risk of the human population. According to Frankham (2005), "There is now compelling evidence that inbreeding depression and loss of genetic diversity increase extinction risk in laboratory populations of naturally out-breeding species". Lack of genetic variation increases susceptibility to diseases and shortens lifespan. Human reproductive cloning could be a solution to infertility, but the impacts of lack of genetic variation on human clone population would be devastating. In the spirit of brotherhood with potential human clones, clones should be spared the agony of existence.

In a highly polarized and discriminatory society; the weight of stigmatization and psychological trauma on clone humans would be terrible. Clone humans would be treated as less human than the naturally created humans. This is different from children created through IVF because the product of IVF retains its uniqueness. The fact that human clones would be genetically identical to an existing or death individual, deprives the clone of its individuality and demeans its human dignity. This is a defilement of the 1997 UNESCO Universal Declaration on the Human Genome and Human Rights "...to respect [humans] uniqueness and diversity". This feeling of worthlessness would be worsen with the realization that its other human clone counterparts are merely created as objects of scientific research.

The hallmark of medical science is to heal, prolong life and sustain humanity. In our quest for knowledge in biomedical research, it will be detrimental to neglect human dignity and undermine the age-long obligation, "do no harm", without which our efforts to serving mankind is vicious and ultimately futile. Human cloning would create more problems than it solves; it lacks

genetic diversity, it would violate human right to life, deform human dignity, increase susceptibility to diseases and loss of individuality.


However, the availability of safe and viable alternatives such as Induced pluripotent stem cells research makes human cloning unnecessary. The energy and resources on human cloning should be channeled in exploring other safe and morally acceptable alternatives in solving human's health problems.


In my research survey, 75% of 294 respondents disapproves human cloning: an indication of humanity withholding its consent.

If we must uphold human dignity, ensure health safety and protect humanity, then there is need for a complete prohibition of human cloning across the globe.

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
Vitum-bioethics model for teaching medical undergraduates - DB and PT 2014

Vertically Integrating Model for Teaching Bioethics to the Medical Undergraduates

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A pragmatic approach for integration of Bioethics Teaching into the existing regular medical curriculum



Preamble

The field of medicine has made rapid advances recently. *Pari passu*, newer ethical issues are also emerging in the field of medicine. But the health care providers are not equipped to effectively deal with them.

Conscious of this lacuna, several initiatives had been taken around the world.

The Division of Ethics of Science and Technology of UNESCO has published a Bioethics Core Curriculum in 2008. The International Chair on Bioethics has formed a very wide international network on Bioethics, and has taken the lead. Conscious of the need for actionable resources, the International Chair has published a series of Case books and Ethical Commentaries. Several countries have gainfully utilized all these resources.

Everyone realizes the utility of learning Bioethics. Several countries have actually started courses in Bioethics. But, at the field level, two issues hamper effective and universal implementation of a bioethics curriculum. The undergraduate medical student is already burdened with a voluminous study load and the time available during the undergraduate course is very short. This issue is compounded by the unavailability of teachers, who are trained in bioethics. These two vexatious issues are sought to be solved by us, by designing a novel model.

In this novel model, designed by us, the UNESCO Bioethics Core Curriculum mentioned above, forms the mainstay; the lesson plan integrates the bioethics modules vertically into the existing general medical curriculum. The USP of this model is the requirement of (i) minimal additional time and, (ii) less number of exclusive bioethics teachers. Due this unique design, this model is christened as 'Vertically Integrated Teaching of Bioethics to the Undergraduate Medical students (acronym: vitum-bioethics).

The design of such a curriculum is a demanding task. This novel design was first presented in the form of an invited lecture at the International Seminar of the Nepal National Unit of UNESCO Bioethics Network (22-23 Jan 2014). Subsequently, the same was submitted to the 7th National Congress of the Indonesian Network of Health Bioethics and Humanities (14-16 Mar 2014).

The Asia Pacific Chair, Prof Russell D'Souza and the International Chair, Prof Amnon Carmi have commended it and have graciously given critiques. They have also agreed to lend their titles to the future refinements of this model. The development of this model is a continuous process. Consultations are under way with several chairs, in India and abroad. A conclave is scheduled on 20 November 2014, in the SRM University in Chennai, India, towards this direction. A short description of the vitum-bioethics model is given below.

The objectives of the 'vitum-bioethics' model

The course should equip the students with the following skill sets

1. Be able to identify the ethical issues, which occur during medical practice; also, be able to anticipate any issue, which might arise. Apply ethical principles to those issues and arrive at decisions.

- 2. Be able to defend his decisions, by providing rational justifications.
- 3. Additionally, be able to fine tune his decisions, on the basis of moral beliefs, and traditional practices in the particular cultural *milieu*.

Target participants in this course:

The discourse of this model (in the present form) would deal with the undergraduate medical curriculum. Quite obviously, several parts of this model would be eminently applicable to students and practitioners of related streams also, namely (i) allied health sciences, traditional and alternative systems of medicine e.g. nursing, pharmacy, physiotherapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, homeopathy, ayurveda, unani, acupuncture, eastern systems of medicine, naturopathy etc. and, (ii) Law, Social work, Philosophy, Management etc. In fact, bioethics permeates every walk of life, and everyone will benefit from this course.

General principles underlying the design of the Vitum Bioethics model:

- The Curriculum: The curriculum must be uniform across all countries (country). The syllabus incorporates all the 17 modules of the Bioethics Core Curriculum UNESCO 2008 ver1 and all the 15 principles and the 28 articles enshrined in the Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights of UNESCO 2005.
- Resources: Standardized text books covering the entire syllabus shall be prepared. The Case books and Ethical Commentaries published by the International Chair will be utilized. Teacher manuals and all resources shall be made available in the web, as free downloads.
- The Lesson plans: the learning starts from the first day of entry into the medical school. The contents integrate into the regular curriculum, and regular teaching. The total teaching hours is proposed to be around 80-90 hours, spread throughout the entire undergraduate course. It may be adapted, after wide consultations, based on the collective wisdom of all experts.
- The teaching methods: Integrated teaching-learning method shall be employed. Innovative modalities shall occupy a significant number of hours, across all the academic years. Thus, the students will develop a participatory feeling and harbor sustained interest.
- Attendance will be compulsory. A portion of the Internal Assessment marks shall be apportioned exclusively for the attendance.
- Evaluation: The purpose of this evaluation is to assess whether the curriculum has resulted in the achievement of its objectives. Hence, the evaluation shall be two-fold (i) Evaluation of the course curriculum itself and (ii) Evaluation of the students' performance.
- Evaluation of the course curriculum itself, shall be done by constant feedback from students. Such feedback must trigger a response to refine the curriculum.
- Evaluation of the students' performance shall be achieved by (a) traditional written tests and, (b) non formal evaluation (case presentations, assignments, case analysis, group discussions and seminars) shall be given more emphasis.
- Examinations: During the initial period of three years, the evaluation shall be restricted to non-formal methods. When the student has completed the first three units, there shall be

one formal university examination. This examination shall comprise of the usual written pattern — essay questions, short notes, multiple choice questions and oral examination. One of two questions requiring analysis of clinical situations also may be included. Rationale for the timing of this examination: at this period of the regular medical course, the undergraduate medical student would have been well-exposed to the clinical fields - and, he would be relatively free to appear for a written test. The credit for this examination shall not exceed 40% of the total credit mandated for the subject of bioethics for a medical graduand.

After this formal examination, the non-formal evaluation methods shall commence once again. The credit for such non-formal evaluation shall be 40%. Within this non-formal format, objective and measurable parameters (like number and standard of activities) shall be used to award the credits. During the internship period, the credit for learning bioethics (by non-formal evaluation methods) shall be 20% of the total credits.

Further Plans

For the purpose of *training the trainers,* another course material is being prepared. It will be at the level of Masters. Within that curriculum, the core bioethics syllabus will be present. In addition, education technology will be incorporated. The students in that course will consist of existing senior medical teachers. The graduates of that masters course, should be able to function as master teachers/course coordinators of Bioethics. This masters course has already received the approval of the Academic Council of SRM University.

Annexure: The Syllabus and Curriculum of 'vitum-bioethics'

Note: The entire syllabus is presented as Five units. All the seventeen modules of the UNESCO Core Curriculum have been incorporated into these five units. Each unit will be taught during a specific period of the existing undergraduate medical course, in parallel with the regular medical curriculum. Under the heading of each unit, we have described (a) learning objectives (b) syllabus (c) curriculum and (d) evaluation methods, which are specific to that particular unit.

Unit I. Introduction to Bioethics & Current perspectives in Bioethics (Total 12 hours)

Learning objectives of Unit I

(i) To get an insight into the field of Bio ethics, including current perspectives.

Syllabus of Unit I

<u>Unit I Sec 1. Introduction</u> (3 hours)

What is ethics, bioethics, and medical ethics? Disciplines within bioethics, brief history of different bioethics codes over the centuries, moral values across different cultures and religions, how spiritual (religious) beliefs and societal customs have influenced the fundamental

moral values? Changes over the centuries, brief description of western streams of philosophy, the traditional philosophy and values in the eastern world. How migration of people(s) has resulted in a confluence of principles, how the recently found mobility across the continents has accelerated an amalgamation?

<u>Unit I Section 2. Modern perspectives in bioethics and in medical ethics</u> (3 hours)

Different codes of bioethics and medical ethics, the current efforts to evolve a globally applicable ethical code, Hippocratic Oath, the ten principles of Nuremberg code of 1947, Declaration of Geneva (Physician's oath) 1948, amended in 2006, Helsinki declaration of the World Medical Association 1964 and its 6th revision in 2008, UNESCO Universal Declaration on Human rights, the role of UNESCO Chair in Bioethics and the international network on bioethics, Current perspectives.

<u>Unit I Section 3. Codes of the statutory medical licensing authorities</u> (3 hours)

Standard codes and guidelines of different countries, those specific to each country shall be presented to the medical students e.g. Medical Council of India Code of Ethics 2002, Care shall be taken to explain how each clause of the code is relevant. In addition, comparative study of each of the clauses, across countries and cultures.

<u>Unit I Section 4. Bio ethics related to the fundamental sciences</u> (3 hours)

Dignity of human in life and death, physiological and biochemical experimentation in human and in animals and rights of a persona, humaneness, the principle of equality of races and justice, philosophical ruminations into certain experiments conducted in human history - a dubious and recent example of this would be Auschwitz.

Lesson Plan of Unit I

This unit I will be taught in the first academic year, right from the first day of entry into medical school. In addition to didactic lectures, each session shall be interactive. The master teacher of Bioethics of the institution (the course coordinator himself) will personally handle the first three sections. The section Four shall be handled by senior professors in anatomy, physiology and biochemistry - one hour each.

Evaluation for the unit I

No individual university examination shall be prescribed. Non formal evaluation shall be done by alternate means like seminars, group discussions and assignments etc. A few brief questions shall be included in the question papers of fundamental sciences, in the regular examination .

<u>Unit II. Core Bioethics and Basics of Medical ethics (Total 24 hours)</u> (didactic teaching 12 hours + interactive discussions, case-work studies, seminars etc., by students 12 hours)

Learning Objectives of unit II

Unit II will cover the core bioethics related the basic sciences.

Syllabus of unit II (didactic lectures only: 12 hours)

<u>Unit II Section 1</u>. <u>Concepts of health</u> (2 hours)

Disease and healing, Right to Health, Patient as a person, An individual's dignity, privacy and confidentiality. The limitations of an individual's confidentiality, in the interest of general society.

Unit II Section 2. Patient's bill of rights (2 hours)

Right of a patient to have information about his/her medical condition, autonomy and freedom of choice of treatment. The responsibilities of a patient as a member of the society.

<u>Unit II Section 3</u>. <u>Equality and Justice</u> (6 hours)

Ethics of human life, right to live with health, duties of the society and the state to provide for every individual, equitable distribution of services, allocation of resources in health care systems, case studies like selection of patients for renal dialysis in the United States in the eighties. Religious beliefs and bioethics like aversion to blood transfusion, the Buddhist tradition of eye donation, etc. Human duty to rescue a fellow human being or other forms of life. Duty of individuals (bystanders) to the society, and to the general public. Non Discrimination and Non Stigmatization in HIV, AIDS, TB, Hansen's disease, Legal issues, the law, court judgements and directives .

<u>Unit II Section 4</u>. <u>Environmental issues and Protecting the future generations</u> (2 hours) Sustainable world, Public health issues, Environmental issues, Biosphere and biodiversity, genetic engineering, Ecological protection.

Lesson plan of unit II

During this period (second academic year), the students will be studying pathology, microbiology and forensic sciences. This is the time that the student will start attending the clinical classes and will come into contact with real patients. This unit is the solid base on which the next unit III will be based. The first two sections are in the clinical sphere and can be handled by the clinicians. The sections 3 and 4 may be fruitfully dealt by the teachers of community medicine.

Evaluation for the unit II

Non formal evaluation shall be done by alternate means like seminars, group discussions and assignments etc. A few brief questions shall be included in the regular question papers of basic sciences.

<u>Unit III. Application of Medical Ethics to the Clinical practice, in general (Total 24 hours)</u> (didactic teaching 12 hours + interactive discussions, case-work studies, seminars etc., by stu-

dents 12 hours)

Learning objectives of unit III

Unit III will cover the core bioethics related to clinical settings, legal insights and case laws, interactive discussions and case studies.

Syllabus and lesson plan of Unit III (didactic lectures only: 12 hours)

<u>Unit III Sec 1</u>. The principles of Evidence Based Medicine (3 hours)

Beneficience, non maleficience, *primum non nocere*, responsibility of a medical personnel, treatment choices and decision making by the treating doctor, Concepts with clinical examples.

<u>Unit III Sec 2</u>. <u>Consent, Assent and Autonomy</u> (3 hours)

The ingredients of an informed consent, Autonomy and the right of a patient to make decisions, the meaning of 'capacity to consent', Persons without the capacity to consent, vulnerable populations, dependency and guardianship, role of family and society in decision making by the patient.

<u>Unit III Sec 3</u>. <u>Professionalism</u> (3 hours)

Contract, Code of conduct, responsibility of a medical personnel in the personal sphere, personal integrity, the Hippocratic oath and the integrity values embodied in that document, human vulnerability on the part of the physicians, procedures to be adopted to prevent human pitfalls (and also false accusations) e.g. chaperoning. The freedom of a doctor to withdraw from a contract, Legal perspectives.

Unit III Sec 4. Physician Patient relationship (3 hours)

Empathy (solidarity and cooperation with the patient), compassion, responsibility of a medical personnel in the professional sphere.

Evaluation methods for Unit III

There must be one formal university examination, when the student has completed the first three units. The questions shall cover all the three units. It shall be a separate university paper, as described earlier.

<u>Unit IV. Special Clinical issues - application of Bioethical principles</u> (Total 24 hours)

(didactic teaching 12 hours + interactive discussions, case-work studies, seminars etc., by students 12 hours.)

Learning objectives of unit IV

This unit will equip the student to apply bioethical principles (i) in the clinical practice of advanced specialities and to (ii) the clinical situations, which have emerged due to advanced technologies.

Syllabus & Lesson plan of Unit IV (didactic lectures only: 12 hours)

<u>Unit IV Section 1. Beginning of Life Issues</u> (2 hours)

Prenatal diagnosis, genetic counseling pediatric stroke neonatal euthanasia, assisted reproductive technologies, surrogacy, designer babies, genetically modified food.

<u>Unit IV Section 2. End of life issues</u> (2 hours)

Definition of death, advanced life support systems, prolongation of life, support to the patient who awaits imminent death, euthanasia (both active and passive.)

Unit IV Section 3. Ethics of human sexuality (1 hour)

Gender reassignment, transgender.

<u>Unit IV Section 4. Organ donation</u> (3 hours)

Organ transplant (liver, eye, bone marrow, stem cell), xenografts, sperm banking, egg banking.

<u>Unit IV Section 5. Ethical principles in conducting research</u> (1 hour)

Experimental research in human subjects and in animals, humane perspectives, human experimentation, conflict of interest. Ethical Guidelines for Biomedical Research on Human Subjects Indian Council of Medical Research 2000, subsequent and similar documents from other countries.

<u>Unit IV Section 6. Research and Clinical trials</u> (3 hours)

Drug trials, remuneration to the investigators, conflict of interest, volunteer research, financial support to participants, difference between inducements and legitimate compensation for loss of earning hours during the trial period, ethics of reporting results, selective reporting, publication ethics, plagiarism.

Curriculum of unit IV

During this period, the students would have already appeared for the clinical examinations in ENT and in Ophthalmology. They would undergo in depth training in all clinical subjects, namely, medicine, surgery, obstetrics, gynaecology, orthopaedics, paediatrics etc. This is the time that the student will be grasping the crux of medical practice. Hence, these topics shall be taken by the respective clinical professors themselves, supplemented by some seminars, and discussions, case scenarios and case studies.

Evaluation methods

There shall not be a separate university paper. The objectives of bioethics teaching would be best served by including one or two compulsory questions, within the main regular paper for each clinical subject, itself. These questions should require some introspection on the part of the students.

<u>Unit V. Internship and skill development</u> (Teaching hours - unlimited - 24x7)

Learning objectives of unit V

This period shall ingrain bioethical principles and medical ethics, in each medical graduand.

Syllabus of Unit V

Unit V Section 1. Equality, Justice and non-discrimination

Society's duty to render assistance to fellow beings, Principles of allocation of scarce facilities, duty to rescue on the part of the bystanders and the general public, the duties of a professional care giver (empathy, compassion, and professional reasoning), non-discrimination and non-stigmatization in the case of diseases like HIV, AIDS, Hansen's disease, tuberculosis etc. World and Environmental issues, Biocentrism, Biosphere and biodiversity, genetic engineering, Ecological and environmental issues in Bioethics, Public health issues.

Unit IV Section 2. Value systems on one's professional life

Guarding oneself from malpractices, Issues like over-investigating the patient, charging of fees, fee splitting prescription of drugs, medical insurance norms, Legitimate defensive practices for self-protection against allegations of malpractice and negligence, documentation of management. The Law, Judgements and court directives in general, specific case law discussions, interactive discussions.

Curriculum of unit V

During this period, the students will be learning by precept and by personal practice. Hence, these topics shall be taken by the respective clinical professors themselves at the bedside and the wards. It shall be supplemented by some seminars, and group discussions, case scenarios and case studies.

Evaluation methods for unit V

There need not be any university examinations. The non-formal evaluation shall have an element of objectivity. Examples are assignments like writing articles on specific topics, review of a current case scenario, conducting seminars for the junior students, active participation in group discussions etc.



And what if we could use artificial wombs? Will we have to change our idea of humanity? Would it lead to a social (r)evolution?


A journey through the theme of "Birth", free from ideologically found prejudices, to find sharable solutions to the questions arisen from the use of the technologies applied to human beings.

Chairman of the Pan African Congress for Ethics and Bioethics (COPAB), the Scientific and political Commission on ethics and bioethics of the African Union. He coordinates the development and facilitation of national forums, regional, continental and International Bioethics in Africa.

International expert in public health and bioethics, Pierre EFFA, is Advisor of major public and private institutions in Africa and as such, it conducts multifaceted activities some of which have resulted in reference publications.

Since October 2015.

We define the African paradigm of Bioethics as "the set of strategies to protect, enhance and promote life".

Andrea Hellemeyer. Psychologist, Social Psychologist, Professor and Researcher Bioethics Institute, Pontificia Universidad Javeriana, Bogotá-Colombia, Head of Unit Bogotá-Colombia, UNESCO Chair in Bioethics - Haifa.

- When was your UNESCO Chair in Bioethics Unit established?

Our Unit was established in December 2014.

What does Bioethics mean to you?

As we can agree bioethics field includes different topics and various meanings. I have been working on human rights for the last 10 years, and I am now very much involved in the peace process that Colombia is facing. Bioethics means now to me a discipline from which professors and researchers can think about complex human situations that challenge our previous knowledge and experience.

About Bioethics: since when have you been involved in this field and how? (specify your particular expertise and interest, please)

I have been involved in the field since 2006, when I started working in the Department of Ethics

and Human Rights in the Faculty of Psychology, with Professor Juan Jorge Michel Fariña in Argentina.

- How much is your place of work, your University, your Country interested or involved in Bioethics?

Our university is one of the oldest and prestigious in Colombia. It was founded in 1623. The fact that we have a specific Bioethics Institute to teach and research is a very good sign on the importance that it has within the academic community.

- Can you describe which kind of problems you found talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical message, if any, and why?

Our community is very interested in this field. Our Institute offers a Bioethics Masters Degree, having students coming from different disciplines, Medicine, Philosophy, Social Sciences etc. The academic community and general public are open and interested in this field. We are not facing any particular problem spreading bioethical message.

- What were the positive sides talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical messages? Currently, Colombia faces a historical opportunity to put to an end to the armed conflict with one of the oldest guerillas and to begin the transition to peace. Negotiations between the Colombian state and FARC in Havana have reached an advanced stage. In the post-conflict context it comes the need to reconfigure symbolic territory as a reorganization of public social spaces.
- **Describe your Unit's future projects, and your presentation for last Naples Conference.**In our last international conference in Naples, my presentation was related to a major consequence of the war in Colombia: Children and forced displacement.

The armed conflict in Colombia has been ongoing since the mid-1960s. Five decades of war has inflicted profound effects on the fabric of society. Apart from the countless deaths that deserve to be mention in the first place, Colombia has the highest number of internally displaced persons with most recent reports at 6 million people. According to Unicef, 55% of this population is under 18 years old and 13% are under the age of 5. Although the armed conflict has provoked many problems, this is among the most significant due to its magnitude.

Unavoidably the war involves forced migration, the displacement of the poor, and an exponential rise of social disassociation. Forced displacement in Colombia has mainly affected farmers, who have had to abandon their land and migrate to mid-sized and large cities in search of humanitarian help. Since the late 1990s, Colombians have expressed concern for the armed conflict's impact on children and youth. Negative mental health outcomes are a well-known and troubling consequence that affects more than two million girls, boys and youth. In order to confront this issue, the state and civil society organization have developed and implemented programs with a psychosocial focus. These programs were developed in different regions of the country to fundamentally address the populations that have been directly affected by the armed conflict.

The various perspectives guiding intervention approaches and proposals generally focus on three ways in which the armed conflict impacts children and youth: first, as direct suffering of violence from the armed conflict; second, as a violation of their rights to life within the context of the armed conflict; and lastly, as reluctant actors in the armed conflict.

Additionally, it is worth noting that as a consequence of the conflict the general population of children and youth has experienced a disruption in their perception of justice, legality, and accountability, which are fundamental to the promotion and strengthening of a peace agreement. Our unit is currently focused in a research project related to Political Culture for Peace.

General Objective:

To contribute to the design and/ or to influence the public polices of mental health and psychosocial care strategies that promote the subjectivation processes and transformative uses of memory in children and youth affected by the Colombian armed conflict.

Identification of designs and practices of the programs themselves will produce interventional methods for psychosocial care. Furthermore, it will estimate the scope and effects of the diverse psychosocial public policies from the state and civil society organizations in order to contribute to the processes of systemization, adjustments, and empowerment.

This project will contribute to current work because conceptual and methodological exploration (i.e. application), categories of subjectivation, and transformative uses of memory are essential to resolve the conceptual gaps and content of mental health policies, as well as the care strategies already implemented by many organizations.

Specific Objectives

- 1. Explore and map notions of subjectivation and the transformative use of memory of the armed conflict and its practical implications.
- 2. Against this categorical and practical map, analyze the scope, limits, gaps, and problems that are present in public policies.
- 3. Identify and evaluate the contribution that psychosocial care practices offer to processes of subjectivation and transformative uses of memory of the armed conflict in children and youth.
- 4. Create recommendations for the development and/ or adjustment of public policies for the psychosocial care of children and youth affected by the armed conflict.
- 5. Design a training strategy aimed at the implementation of the project's results by the program operators of psychosocial care in public entities and civil society organizations.

Bogotá- Colombia Unit is very interested in inviting other Units, which are working on some of these topics: Human Rights, Politics and Peace Culture, War and post conflict scenarios, forced displacement, among others, to be part of this research project. We are willing to share ideas, methodologies and establishing partnerships.

Dr. Andrie Panayiotou, Head of Unit

- Short presentation: name, professional qualification, university affiliation, and Country:

Dr. Andrie Panayiotou, PhD; Assistant Professor in Public Health at the Cyprus International Institute for Environmental and Public Health, Cyprus University of Technology, Cyprus. I am of Cypriot origin.

- When was your UNESCO Chair in Bioethics Unit established?

The Cyprus Unit of the UNESCO Chair was established on February 2016 and it's hosted at the Cyprus University of Technology in Limassol.

What does Bioethics mean to you?

Bioethics is an integral part of my work in health sciences and public health, although one may not always think about such issues directly if one is not familiar with bioethical concepts. From genetic testing projects for familial diseases to designing and running epidemiological studies for common diseases, asking the right ethical questions and starting a debate (without always necessarily reaching a consensus answer) among those involved helps ensure that participants are treated in the best possible way. Given my background in biology, genetics and epidemiology I am more focused on medical ethics but through my involvement in the activities of the Chair I hope to improve my understanding of ethics in other areas as well, such as law and philosophy.

- About Bioethics: since when have you been involved in this field and how? (specify your

particular expertise and interest, please)

I first became aware of ethics when taking an undergraduate course in Ethics while studying biology. It was a very brief introduction, which was then followed by a graduate course in Bioethics during my MSc in Epidemiology. I was intrigued by the questions posed in issues I dealt with frequently, but never really gave much thought to and when I started teaching I tried to incorporate such issues in my epidemiology and genetics courses. Since 2015, I also serve as a member in the Cyprus National Bioethics Committee and I chair my University's Committee on Ethics. As I said before, and given my expertise in epidemiology and study design, my interest lies mainly in medical ethics that have to do with the participation of both healthy individuals and patients in population studies and clinical trials, as well as patient care and management.

- How much is your place of work, your University, your Country interested or involved in Bioethics?

I believe that Bioethics may still be a relatively new concept for Cyprus, at least for the wider public, however in the past decade or so, efforts have been made to promote knowledge about such issues, albeit with an emphasis on medical ethics that have to do with patient care. The Cyprus National Bioethics Committee was established in 2001 and has played a big part in promoting bioethics knowledge among the research community in Cyprus. Currently, all research involving humans has to get approval by the Committee and efforts are continuing to bring such concepts forward to the wider public. Alongside the National Committee, Universities in Cyprus, both public and private, are making serious efforts to promote bioethics to their students, although emphasis is still placed mostly on medical students. The Cyprus University of Technology, which hosts the Cyprus Unit, has established an Ethics Committee in order to promote knowledge among students and faculty and ensure research is held to the highest ethical standards.

- Can you describe which kind of problems you found talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical message, if any, and why?

I found that once people understood what Bioethics is about they would be more than positive about it and especially students would find the concept very intriguing. The biggest problem, perhaps, is convincing people from non-medical disciplines that Bioethics may also apply to their work if it affects human beings, as they may have never thought of it under that light before and getting them to see that thinking about ethics is not about making things more difficult but better.

- What were the positive sides talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical messages?

Seeing students get excited about debating such issues and reaching their own conclusions.

Describe your Unit's future projects, and your presentation for last Naples Conference:

The Cyprus Unit is a very recent one and we didn't have a chance to participate at the Naples Conference. We are currently working on the celebrations for the first World Bioethics Day in October and have just held a national competition for the poster design to be used. We hope that as we spread the message of Bioethics more and more people —and especially students—will get involved and we hope to see a great participation in the next World Conference in Limassol. I

am delighted the Chair has chosen Cyprus for this prestigious event and especially Limassol the home of the Cyprus University of Technology and would like to take this opportunity to address a warm welcome to all participants. We look forward to seeing all of you in Cyprus in March!

What does Bioethics mean to you?

o Bioethics for me is 'Respect'. Respect for the human beings, for the existence of other living and non-living beings on earth and for our environment. It is the essence of life. Respect for people's dignity, their rights, opinions, values and every other aspect is what I feel Bioethics is. All other living beings (animals and plants including) also have equal rights as us to be on planet earth. They all make it complete and we have no right to encroach upon their territories. All these diverse spheres of respecting humans, all other living and non living beings and environment are very comprehensively covered under 15 Bioethical Principles adopted by UNESCO.

- About Bioethics: since when have you been involved in this field and how? (specify your particular expertise and interest, please):

o As a student of Medical ethics and law, I learned the importance of ethics in medical practice. Further, during my training as a surgeon and work in intensive care units, I actually recognized the value of following ethics and realized how fragile the relationship between a patient and medical professional was. I realized how important it was to be sensitive and empathetic about people we treat and meet.

My involvement in UNESCO Bioethics, started with the establishment of our unit and soon after with a formal 4 days 3T Bioethics Workshop, organized at our institute by Prof. Russell D'Souza. Having already exposed and realized the importance of some of these issues during my training and practice, I was immediately into it. I decided to give in my best to disseminate the knowledge and experience I had gained and committed myself for the cause.

I am especially interested in bioethical aspects of medical practice and scientific research. Patients, especially uneducated and those of lower socio-economic classes are most vulnerable to exploitation, mostly by the quacks, who are first level health care providers to them. My special interest in research ethics comes from my role in our institutional human research ethics committee.

- How much is your place of work, your University, your Country interested or involved in Bioethics?

- o Well, I would say I am fortunate in this respect too as Bioethics is trending at my institution. Since establishment of our unit last year, we have conducted 3 bioethics workshops, 2 for faculty members and recently one for students. There was overwhelming response from everyone. Seniors and colleagues keep asking me when next we are going to hold one. Our institution has included Bioethics as vertically integrated program in medical graduate curriculum from first to final year.
- o My University (DPU, Pune) is very supportive and proactive about the program. Hon'ble Chancellor Dr. P. D. Patil and Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor Dr. P. N. Razdan are very keen on including bioethics in diverse courses offered by DPU and its various institutions. Their active interest led to incorporation of bioethics in our Medical, Dental, Nursing, Physiotherapy and Biotechnology courses. We are also working on incorporating the same to Ayurvedic and Homeopathic courses. In April this year, we have established National Students' Wing Coordination Centre of UNESCO Chair in Bioethics, Haifa at DPU. On 17th August 2016, we hosted inauguration of MSAI-UNESCO Chair in Bioethics-AIHSU National Program and held First National Level Workshop on Bioethics

for medical students of various medical colleges of India.

Bioethics in India is like a movement, a passion. India is known for having written and incorporated ethics in medical profession as early as 600 B.C. (Sushruta Samhita), which reflected teachings from distant past. As of now, in India we have 50 Units of UNESCO Chair in Bioethics, Haifa, thanks to Prof. Russell D'Souza, whose untiring efforts and motivation led us reach to this level.

- Can you describe which kind of problems you found talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical message, if any, and why?

o Well, in the beginning it was a bit difficult to make people realize, what bioethics is and how is it different from medical ethics, which we had been practising since long. There was another hitch before incorporating this in curriculum because of extra time needed for it in already tightly packed medical curriculum, we also needed number of trained faculty members to train students. We discussed the topics with head of the departments and designed the curriculum in such a way so as to make it an integrated part of already existing teaching schedule. Our faculty was trained by 3T plus E workshop.

What were the positive sides talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical messages?

o Once understood, most of the teaching faculty members were for it, as they felt it needs to be formally taught to students. The realization was so, that our unit was invited to hold talks on Bioethics. Wherever, it was discussed the concepts were highly accepted.

Describe your Unit's future projects, and your presentation for last Naples Conference:

o Our unit, as I said, is very enthusiastically involved in Bioethical training. In future, we are planning to incorporate Bioethical training in various other relevant courses available at DPU including Ph.D. Through our students' wing, we are planning to take various social support activities. Many others are on the card, let's see.



PORTUGAL

Rui Nunes, MD, PhD, University of Porto, Portugal.

- When was your UNESCO Chair in Bioethics Unit established?

November, 2015.

What does Bioethics mean to you?

A way of life: respecting human dignity and the fundamental rights and freedom are the only ways to develop a true secular and pluralistic society. Also, these values are of outstanding importance in medical practice and in biomedical research, namely in biology and genetics because it is a way to guarantee an authentically human future.

- About Bioethics: since when have you been involved in this field and how? (Specify your particular expertise and interest, please):

I am involved in bioethics since 1990 and I got my PhD in the field of bioethics in 1996. I am in charge of organizing the lectures and research at my university, namely in the Faculty of Medicine. Since 1998, I organize a Master Degree in Bioethics and since 2007 a PhD in Bioethics. With more than 350 students enrolled in this program, it is the largest in the Portuguese speaking

world, and more than half of the students are Brazilian due to a partnership between my university and the Federal Council of Medicine (Brazil). Moreover, I was the founder of the Portuguese Association of Bioethics in 2002, the most relevant NGO in Bioethics in Portugal.

- How much is your place of work, your University, your Country interested or involved in Bioethics?

Both my university as my country are deeply committed to the development of Bioethics. Indeed, there was a significant growth of Bioethics in Portugal in the last 20 years that can be measured by a different set of indicators. First of all, the overall number of graduates in Bioethics that has grown exponentially in the last years. Also, the fact that all Portuguese hospitals, public and private ones, have now an ethics committee to regulate research on human beings as well as in animal research. And finally, the fact that Portugal has a modern legislation in most areas of bioethics, from the living will, to genetic engineering or even pregnancy termination and surrogate motherhood. Moreover, there is a huge interest in the media about bioethical questions and dilemmas.

- Can you describe which kind of problems you found talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical message, if any, and why?

The main problems were related to medical practice and to the implementation of innovative legislation. In the last two decades, the acceptance of the informed consent by physicians was problematic given the paternalistic view of medicine common at that time, and to overcome this millenary tradition it was necessary a huge effort from bioethicists namely in medical education. Nevertheless, it is now a generalized and accepted practice in Portugal. Also, with regard to the main sociological and cultural evolutions worldwide, the approval of a different set of laws on bioethics at the Portuguese Parliament indicated some problems namely concerning the awareness of the public regarding the main consequences of enacting this kind of legislation.

What were the positive sides talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical messages?

The positive side of spreading bioethical messages is perceiving a huge societal change in the last two decades, in medical practice, in human research, in animal ethics, or even in environmental protection. And also, witnessing how young generations face bioethical problems in an open and tolerant way, enabling society to evolve in a democratic, plural and participatory way. Indeed, in Portugal huge changes could be perceived in Bioethics and Biolaw and this evolution is generally considered as a main driver of society towards the 21st century.

- Describe your Unit's future projects, and your presentation for last Naples Conference:

The Portuguese Unit will develop its activities in three main areas: a) Repro-genetics; b) End of life care; and c) Teaching of bioethics.



SWEDEN



Prof. Niklas Juth, Head of Unit

- Short presentation: name, professional qualification, University affiliation, and Country of origin:

Niklas Juth, Associate professor in medical ethics at Karolinska Institutet, Stockholm Centre for Healthcare Ethics (CHE), Sweden

- When was your UNESCO Chair in Bioethics Unit established?

January 2016

- What does Bioethics mean to you?

To me, it means the investigation of values and norms within and about health care and health-related issues, which includes basic philosophical questions about, for instance, quality of life and fair allocation of resources. These investigations include both empirically studying what these evaluative and normative judgements actually are and philosophically studying what they ought to be.

- About Bioethics: since when have you been involved in this field and how? (specify your particular expertise and interest, please):

I've been involved with bioethics more seriously since I started my doctoral project on genetic information in 2000. However, before that I worked in health care and also studied ethics for several years. My main research interests are in ethics and bioethics, genetics, and the intersection between political philosophy and medical ethics, e.g. autonomy and justice in health care.

- How much is your place of work, your University, your Country interested or involved in Bioethics?

Since our centre (CHE) is a bioethics centre and our university (Karolinska Institutet) is a Medical University that includes ethics in all its programs, the involvement and interest in Bioethics is huge and growing. The same goes, I would say, for Sweden at large. There are some pressing bioethical issues that receive a lot of public interest and media coverage, for instance regarding prioritization, scientific misconduct in life sciences, end-of-life decisions, and conscientious objections.

- Can you describe which kind of problems you found talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical message, if any, and why?


Since Bioethics deals with controversial issues, not seldom dramatic ones about life and death, it evokes a lot of emotions, including psychological strategies to avoid the issues. This becomes apparent when teaching the subject, discussing it with students. One such reaction is that issues within Bioethics cannot be the subject of rational discussion: any position goes since it is merely a matter of gut reaction. Another is that these issues should be left entirely to the medical professions and that all Bioethical questions can be transformed to medical or technical questions.

What were the positive sides talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical messages?

That one hopefully increases awareness of the Bioethical issues and the importance of addressing them as systematically and thoughtfully as one can.

Describe your Unit's future projects, and your presentation for last Naples Conference:

Since the Unit is so new, we did not attend the Naples conference. One of the Unit's future projects is to look more in depth into the notion of Patient-Centred Care, which is now public policy in Sweden despite a rather sketchy idea about what the notion actually implies in practice.

- Short presentation: name, professional qualification, university affiliation, and Country of origin:

Daniel Fu-Chang Tsai, MD., Ph.D., Professor, Department & Research Institute of Medical Education & Bioethics, National Taiwan University College of Medicine, Taiwan, Attending Physician, Department of Medical Research, National Taiwan University Hospital Director, Center for Biomedical Ethics, National Taiwan University Head of Taiwan Unit, International Network of UNESCO Chair in Bioethics, Vice President, International Association of Bioethics (2016).

When was your UNESCO Chair in Bioethics Unit established?

It was established in 2007, after the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics international conference in Elat, Israel.

- What does Bioethics mean to you?

As a physician, bioethics is part of my work. From 1996 to 1999, I undertook my Ph.D. study in bioethics at University of Manchester, UK that was the start of my career in bioethics. My daily work is also about bioethics: I am responsible for the education and research in bioethics, and for establishing policies and laws related to bioethics.

- About Bioethics: since when have you been involved in this field and how? (specify your particular expertise and interest, please):

I was interested in medical ethics as a medical student. Then, for my career planning as a family physician, I thought that apart from clinical services, I could, at the same time, be a medical ethics researcher and teacher. So I started to prepare for this. After graduating from medical school and practicing family medicine for 7 years, I moved to UK to study bioethics. I returned to Taiwan in 1999 and was involved in the teaching of medical ethics for students in medicine, pharmacy, nursing and physical therapy. I also taught bioethics to students in engineering, philosophy, and life sciences. I was involved in ethics mechanisms in hospitals, such as the clinical ethics committees and research ethics committee/IRB. I have developed clinical ethics for the past 17 years, resulting in a full-function clinical ethics committee in our university hospital. That is, the committee provides ethics consultation, education, and policy development.

I'm also involved with research ethics—like the IRB/REC operation. I am currently the chairman of research ethics committee of NTUH. This Research Ethics Committee has four panels, each holding a monthly meeting. Our RECs review over 1,000 medical research and clinical trial protocols per year. I also work for a few national programs in clinical ethics, research ethics, and medical education.

Apart from these public services, my personal research interests include genetics ethics, transplantation ethics, bioethics methods, and cross-cultural bioethics—specifically, comparing Confucius ethics with modern bioethics theories, such as theory of justice, autonomy, and family involvement in decision-making.

- How much is your place of work, your University, your Country interested or involved in Bioethics?

The interest and the involvement of my university, hospital, and country have increased remarkably after my returning and devoting to bioethics development in Taiwan. For example, we have a fully-functioning clinical ethics committee and research ethics committee in hospitals and a centre for biomedical ethics at the University. Also, the Ministry of Health and Welfare and the Ministry of Education both sponsored many bioethics education programs, bioethics and ELSI research programs at national level. However, the levels of engagement from different hospitals and universities varied.

- Can you describe which kind of problems you found talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical message, if any, and why?

This is a very practical issue to me. In earlier times (around 1999), most doctors and students saw medical ethics with a very traditional perspective, seeing it as a kind of "moral preaching" or propaganda asking doctors to be good doctors. "Moral preaching" is not welcomed and repels students, making them reluctant to taking classes.

Therefore, I worked on bringing in the analytical and philosophical perspectives of bioethics and introduced bioethics as a scholarly discipline that can be learned and practiced. Bioethics is to be

perceived as a clinical skill—a practical skill that can help ethical problem-solving and improve the quality of care and patient satisfaction. Very importantly, it also helps students and physicians in training know what is "morally right" and "legally safe" in their practices. Our efforts have been fruitful—we now have more healthcare professionals and students interested in entering the field of bioethics, as they have a better understanding of bioethics as scholarly discipline and as important clinical skills.

- What were the positive sides talking about Bioethics and spreading bioethical messages?


It reminds the learners of the "core values" of medicine and the "aims" of medical education. For the society, it helps people think about the impact of modern biomedical technologies on individuals, families, and society, as well as the ethical, legal and social dimensions that they should be concerned with. It is important to understand the issues and think about how technology influences us—how to apply technology and not to be ruled by technology. Eventually, learning bioethics is to reflect and appreciate the value of life and living, and to enjoy what modern technology can bring to the human race, while avoid the undesired consequences, such as becoming dehumanized. Modern bioethics is largely enhanced by the development of modern biomedical technology. It is important not to let technology take away your humanity and human dignity—you can appreciate its convenience and positive contributions to your life, but should be careful not to be objectified. One should always reflect on the value and the meaning of life.

- Describe your Unit's future projects, and your presentation for last Naples Conference:

At the Naples Conference last year, I presented a paper on "Culture of Red Envelopes in Medical Practice: A Confucian Reflection on Conflict of Interests."

In past few years, I was in charge of the projects on "Promoting education in Science, Technology and Society (STS)", "National project in enhancing humanities and social science education in medical education", and currently the "Program for research ethics education" entrusted by the Ministry of Education. I was also in charge of the "Project of building Taiwan clinical ethics network" entrusted by the Ministry of Health and Welfare, and "ELSI group for National Research Program for Biopharmaceuticals" entrusted by the Ministry of Science and Technology.

I am currently the coordinator for "Medical education discipline" commissioned by the Department of International Cooperation and Science Education, Ministry of Science and Technology. I also lead another ELSI project on the development of new vaccines. I also do research in genetic ethics, transplantation ethics, cross-cultural bioethics, and medical education. Lastly, I have established a Master program in medical education and bioethics 2 years ago, and I hope to create an independent master program in bioethics in the future.

GERMANY

German Unit at University of Applied Sciences and Arts, Hannover:

- We work in the area of medical research in developing countries from the standpoint of ethical, legal, socio-economic conditions. One of the current research is the development of drugs in the so-called low income countries, to check whether the patients participating in the studies of the pharmaceutical industry, will also benefit from the results of this research by a subsequent marketing approval of new drugs in their countries. We have research projects in Nigeria, Sudan, Lebanon and India.
- We organized an "International Conference on Health Research 2016 Ethics, Policies and Practice for Patient Benefit" from 7th 9th June 2016 at Hochschule Hannover, Germany. The conference was designed to offer a platform for the exchange of information and knowledge and to hold discussions, lectures and workshops enabling future key personnel to gain and expand knowledge and understanding of essential aspects of Health Research.

Our Conference on Health Research was formed to be a forum to discuss and learn about rise in research activity in the medical/clinical area. As commonly known this area is strictly regulated and based on well-defined ethical principles. The need of the time was to discuss the overall potential and those aspects which might include critical and/or diverse interpretations.

Our Chair, Prof. Amnon Carmi attended the Conference as well as other Unit Heads and made the Conference a successful event with speakers and participants from 12 different countries.

Also Prof. Gerhard Fortwengel and Dr. Sam Ibeneme presented in 21st International AIDS Conference in Durban, South Africa and both will represent the unit at the SoCRA 2016 Annual Conference in Montreal, Canada on the end of September/early October.





INDIA NODAL CENTRE

UNESCO Ethics Teachers Training Course (ETTC) at SRM University, 10-14 Apr 2016 and 7 th Conclave of Vice Chancellors of Indian Health Sciences Universities, 16 Apr 2016.

Report

Preamble: The demand for medical teachers to teach bioethics to the medical students and professionals has been largely unmet. Hence, Bioethics teaching program could not be started in several institutions, worldwide. To bridge this gap, the UNESCO started the ETTC program for training the trainers.

The India Nodal Bioethics Centre of SRM University has always taken the lead in this field. In the year 2014, the India Nodal Bioethics Centre (SRM University) designed a pragmatic curriculum, under the name and style of vitum bioethics. The syllabus of this course followed the UNESCO Core Curriculum of Bioethics. This model was presented in various forums in Nepal, Philippines, India, 10th World Conference on bioethics, Medical Ethics and Health Law and in the International Forum of Teachers of Bioethics, in Jerusalem. It received widespread appreciation of all, including the UNESCO Chair on Bioethics at Haifa. For wider dissemination worldwide, it was published in the premiere issue of Global Bioethics Enquiry in 2015. Since that time, this vitum bioethics model has been adapted in various forms, by several institutions, globally.

In 2015 itself, the first module of this teaching model, was taught to the First year MBBS class of SRM University. This first module, styled as 'Essential Bioethics Foundation Course' has a curriculum of 10 contact teaching hours, spread over six weeks. Based on the feedback already received from the students themselves, we are in the process of increasing the contact hours to twelve.



UNESCO Ethics Teachers Training Course at SRM University

True to its tradition, SRM University took the lead role in training Medical Teachers from various countries in Asia Pacific Australia region. This ETT course was conducted under the auspices of UNESCO Bangkok office on 10-15 April 2016 and was the second in this region. The SRM University hosted the entire project.

Pre conference optional lectures: On the first day, 10 April 2016, there was an optional introductory course on the Universal Declaration of Human Rights by Dr Sue Vize, Regional Adviser at the UNESCO Bangkok office.

The Inaugural function: On 11 April 2016, the course was formally inaugurated. Dr. K. Sridhar, Pro Vice Chancellor (Medical) of SRM University welcomed the gathering. Dr. S. Geethalakshmi, Vice Chancellor of Tamilnadu Dr. MGR Medical University, in her inaugural address, stressed that ethics is the core of medical and the allied health practices. With advances in medical technology and biomedical engineering, newer ethical issues emerge every day. She applauded the initiative taken by SRM University in conducting this capacity building. Ms. Sue Vize, Regional Adviser, UNESCO Bangkok in her special address, said such projects, would certainly increase the awareness among the public and the medical professionals. She also said that the UNESCO appreciates the efforts taken by SRM university, in conducting this course and is proud to be associated with SRM university. Dr. Russell D'Souza, Head, Asia-Pacific Division of UNESCO Bioethics, Australia in his speech, narrated the starting of Bioethics units in India and neighbouring countries. He said that more than 100 units had been established in 52 countries, out of which the highest number of 22 units were functioning in India. The Pro Vice Chancellor (Planning & Development) of SRM University, the Registrar, the Director (Medical), the Director (Health Sciences) and the Dean Medical of SRM university graced the occasion and felicitated the ETTC.

Dr. D. Balakrishnan, the Lead Head of India Nodal Bioethics Centre (INBC), read the report of the INBC, from its inception on 14.08.2013. He proudly listed the milestones achieved, namely (i) the incubation and establishment of the various other units in India and in neighboring countries (ii) the pragmatic vitum bioethics (vertically integrating model for teaching Bioethics to the UG Medical students), and (iii) the Essential Bioethics foundation course. Both these modules had been developed by SRM University and are much acclaimed widely. Finally, Dr. P. Thangaraju, the Head of India Nodal Bioethics Centre, SRM University proposed vote of thanks. He acknowledged the unstinting support of the management of SRM University, in scaling such heights.



The activities, during the ETTC:

This ETTC was conducted in the Potheri campus of SRM university. 36 senior teachers, selected from various countries viz. Australia, Ireland, Srilanka, Nepal and India benefitted from this course. They were trained, by an eminent faculty from UNESCO. The faculty was led by Ms. Sue Vize, Regional Adviser, UNESCO, Bangkok. The other foreign faculty were Prof Muzaherul Haq (Bangladesh), Dr. Russell D'Souza (Melbourne) and Dr Danielle (Israel). Each participant was individually trained in the education technology, specific to Bioethics.

The sessions included the following:

- 1. Global and National Perspectives on Ethics teaching trends, challenges and opportunities.
- 2. Gender perspectives and Ethics.
- 3. Ethics teaching in action: teaching methods to implement the UNESCO core curriculum.
- 4. Classroom communication: understanding, pedagogy and psychology of students and simulated teaching presentation.
- 5. Ethics teaching in action: Informed consent using case studies to teach Bioethics.
- 6. Ethics teaching in action: Autonomy using case studies to teach Bioethics.
- 7. Ethics teaching action: Benefit & Harm using case studies to teach Bioethics.
- 8. Ethics teaching action: Bioethics Committees.
- 9. Professional Ethics in South Asia.
- 10. Ethics teaching in action: Lesson planning and evaluation.
- 11. Ethics teaching in action: Building a case study.
- 12. Class room communication: Pedagogy and psychology using effective communication in classroom.
- 13. Classroom communication: Pedagogy and psychology -using emotional intelligence.
- 14. Every day, the participants held Round table discussion of the topics of the day.
- 15. Additionally, at the start of each day, the participants actively recalled the previous day's sessions and this simple technique reinforced the learning process.
- 16. Participant's presentations: this was a unique feature. Each of the participants made a presentation (a multimedia lecture) on a topic of his / her choice related to bioethics. These presentations were held in four parallel sessions. The faculty observed the content, delivery and style of the lecture. Based on such an in-depth analysis, the faculty suggested improvements.
- 17. Closing session: In this session, the trainees outlined their future plans, on return to their stations. Concluding remarks were made by Ms. Sue Vize, Dr. P. Thangaraju and by Dr. Russell D Souza. The course completion certificates were distributed by Dr P Thangaraju, the Head of the INBC of SRM University. This ETTC is a course to train the trainers. The participants of this course will get back to their own institutions and conduct several such training camps. Thus, this ETTC will have a cascading effect in capacity building, in the entire region.



Summary of the Project

The mandate of the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics is to introduce teaching, training and research in medical ethics in medical schools and adopt innovative methods of teaching. Nepal has increasing number of medical schools in various parts. In addition to teaching conventional bioethics modeled on Western philosophy, addressing cultural relevant issues unique to the subcontinent needs to be incorporated in the curriculum. Increasing litigation, globalization and advances in technology has posed new ethical dilemmas for which medical graduates are ill prepared and hence, a legal and social dimension in ethics are to be included in the curriculum.

The aim of this Workshop is to address the introduction on the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics among participants, explore the ways to include it in UG and PG medical curriculum of Nepal. The input from the participants and also from external faculty with experience involved in 'Bioethics in medical curriculum' was expected to spear-head this initiative.

The Bioethics Curriculum Workshop

Attempt was made to discuss and develop a consensus about the development of model curriculum compatible to the one commended by the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics and by the Asia Pacific Program Chair.

The Academic leaders of the Nepalese medical institutions and the expert invitees, who have great expertise in this regard, arrived with their observations. And, a discussion and refining was in order. The outcome of the deliberations of the workshop were introduction of the Unit, brain storming and concern raising among the participants and develop a consensus on the inclusion of Bioethics in UG and PG curriculum of Nepal.

Activity of the Kazakhstan Unit

In the Republic of Kazakhstan some changes were introduced in the existing legislation which provides for a mandatory condition compliance with standards and regulations in the conduct of clinical trials. Central and local bioethics committees were established; standard operating procedures for conducting clinical trials were developed and approved.

In order to prepare professionals to work in local committees, as well as for putting into practice the requirements of current legislation on bioethics, Republican Public Association "National Medical Association" has developed a training program to improve training for specialists with higher medical and pharmaceutical education and created "Medical Law and Bioethics" Chair.

Since 2015, Kazakhstan Unit of the International Network of the UNESCO Chair in Bioethics has created, which is accredited by the Institute of Psychology and Psychotherapy (Almaty). On behalf of the Department seminars, lectures on bioethics, as well as conferences with the participation of the experts near and far abroad, were conducted for health workers of the country.




